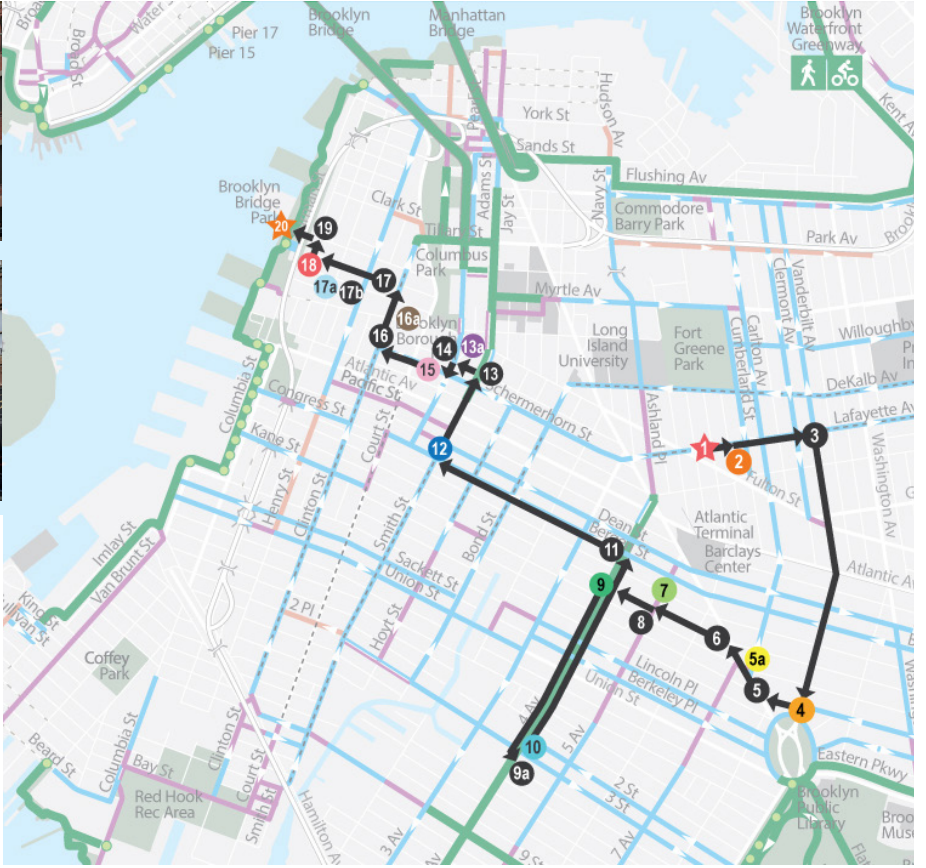

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This 5-mile self-guided ride will take you through several neighborhoods in and near Downtown Brooklyn to visit 8 historic sites that represent the often untold experience and influence of LGBT individuals on New York City history and culture. As you ride by places documented and mapped by the NYC LGBT Historic Sites Project—with several buildings since converted to new uses—take a moment to learn about the contributions of the activists and artists who made their mark on the city for generations to come.
