The meeting was called to order by Chairperson, James Stratton at 5:55 PM.

Public Session:

Robert Bellinger - New Amsterdam Branch Library - Announced the library will open with a ribbon-cutting ceremony on May 3, 1989 at 12:00 noon.

Executive Session:

The minutes of the monthly meeting held March 14, 1989 were adopted as presented.

Reports of Elected Officials:

Meg Reed - Representative of State Senator, Manfred Ohrenstein - Reported the State budget has still not been approved. The Human Resources Administration has reversed its announced policy to close drop-in-centers from 2-6 AM.

Stephanie Pinto - Representative of Comptroller, Harrison J. Goldin - Reported a letter has been sent to the Battery Park City Authority in support of filling in a drain at the north end of Battery Park City and requesting that the sewage outflow line be installed under the landfill and spill into the Hudson River from the western edge of the bulkhead.

Miriam Friedlander, City Councilmember - Distributed and discussed a statement on charter revisions which would strengthen the City Council as the sole legislative body of the City of New York by transferring land-use matters to the body. The Council is already involved in the budget process and oversees City agencies and social service issues. She also discussed developing alternate and less expensive programs for dealing with drug abusers than spending \$130,000,000 for 800 unit jail barges. She expressed support for naming two squares, one to recognize efforts among the poor by Pierre Touissant and the other in recognition of Fr. John Drumgoole's work with homeless children. The City Council will hold a hearing to discuss spending by the Public Development Corporation.

Borough President's Report

Michael Kharfen - Representative of Borough President, David Dinkins - Distributed the monthly "**By-Line**" and reported HRA has withdrawn its proposal to close drop-in-centers during the night. He invited everyone to join in opening the library on May 3rd.

District Manager's Report

Paul Goldstein - Reported on the following items:

- George Washington festivities: Will be held April 29th and 30th. A fireworks display will take place on Saturday night and a parade will be held Sunday afternoon. The Police Department has issued extensive traffic restrictions for this weekend.
- Library: The Library Committee recommends that the branch be named the New Amsterdam Branch; it will open May 3rd. The NYPL Board of Trustees must approve the name of the branch. Discussion by Board members resulted in a resolution to empower the Library Committee to express the feelings of the Board as to who should participate in the ribbon-cutting ceremony. Opposition to the Mayor's participation was expressed because of the difficulties experienced with the Administration, especially in obtaining funding for the library.
- Continuation of Friends of the Library: People will be needed to serve in the organization. Another fundraising event will be scheduled in the Spring. Only 13 Community Board members have contributed to the library thus far; others are encourage to do so.
- 250 Water Street: The Landmarks Preservation Commission sent the application back to the developer for revision; the design was deemed inappropriate to the district.
- Noise complaints, especially with regard to construction: Relevant City agencies are being asked to more seriously assess impact on residential neighborhoods before issuing permits for nighttime and weekend work.

Chairperson's Report

James Stratton - Discussed the jury process and his experience as foreman of a jury. The attempted murder case resulted in conviction and imprisonment. Jim pointed out how well our system works.

Committee Reports

Battery Park City

S. Coron

Reported that plans for the DiSuvero sculpture proposed for the North Park have been cancelled and a new design is to be developed. A meeting was held with David Emil of Battery Park City Authority to discuss a "Y" type facility proposed to be constructed on the first two floors of a building across from Stuyvesant H.S. A proposal calling for a 70,000 square foot facility, which was developed by the Youth Committee with the assistance of Iris Alex, will be reviewed by the Battery Park City Authority. Such a facility would be included in an agreement to develop this site and would be financed by the developer.

Financial District

G. Keller

Submitted two committee resolutions for the Board's consideration. The resolutions: (1) a request for new bids for Pier 11, to include higher standards for concession design and entertainment and (2) a proposal to name the intersection of Church Street and Barclay Street "Pierre Touissant Square". Both resolutions were approved by a vote of 28 in favor, 0 opposed with 0 abstentions. An informational presentation was made to the Committee on a granite building to be constructed at 68 William Street. In discussions between the Committee and representatives of the Zeckendorf Organization, committee members reiterated concerns regarding traffic issues and the size of the building proposed for South Ferry Plaza. It was suggested that the funneling of vehicular traffic to the ferry and turn-arounds for buses and drop-offs be moved away from the Battery Park playground. The developer is seeking enabling legislation to accomplish the demapping of Peter Minuet Park; this is a separate process from the ULURP for the building. The Zeckendorf Organization promised to deliver an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) shortly.

Civic Center

C. Gaines

Presented a committee resolution recommending approval of the application for a Certificate of Appropriateness for 232-234 Front Street with the provision that the arched canopy be removed and replaced by one equivalent to the original. The resolution was approved by a vote of 28 in favor, 0 opposed with 0 abstentions. A second resolution was approved by the same vote to name the plaza at Frankfort and Gold Streets "Drumgoole Square" in recognition of Fr. John C. Drumgoole's dedicated service in ministering to the needs of homeless children in Lower Manhattan.

Parks and Environment

M. Wils

A committee resolution recommending approval of proposed changes in rules and regulations by the Parks Department in order to control the abuse of City parks was tabled by a vote of 16 in favor, 13 opposed and 0 abstentions. A letter will be sent to request that the record of the public hearing be held open until the Board takes a position.

Transportation and Uniformed Services

A. Compocchia

Two committee resolutions were approved by the Board by a vote of 29 in favor, 0 opposed with 0 abstentions. One resolution addressed sanitation problems on the Nassau Street Mall; the other the moratorium on summons by the Department of Sanitation. The owner of a building on Theatre Alley plans to improve sanitation, lighting and drainage conditions there. The tour bus parking problem on West Street will be discussed further in committee.

Youth

R. Warsager

A resolution calling for a 5 "Year School Building Capital Plan", presented to the Board last month by Assemblyman, Mark A. Siegel, was approved by a vote of 26 in favor, 0 opposed with 0 abstentions. A resolution recommending that funding be granted to Marleen Pennison and Dancers for a Summer youth program was approved by a vote of 25 in favor, 0 opposed with 1 abstention. Child safety and discipline workshops are being planned.

Social Services

M. Flatley

Announced that the Human Resources Administration has rescinded its order to close drop-in-centers from 2:00 AM to 6:00 AM. Maureen read a letter in appreciation of Community Board #1's efforts from Rev. Peacock of Heuss House. A subcommittee has met to discuss the needs of the senior citizens at Independence Plaza. A similar meeting is being planned with the senior residents of Southbridge Towers.

Landmarks, Arts and Cultural Affairs

J. Dixon/H. Bromm

Is concerned that requests to Community Board #1 for review of public art installations have the appropriate sponsorship before presentation to the Community Board. The committee plans to develop proposal submission guidelines. The Mark DiSuvero sculpture proposed for the North Park has been cancelled. Jenny expressed her feeling that comments on other installations of public art in the district may have influenced this decision. A committee resolution in support of the creation of the "American Merchant Mariners' Memorial" a sculpture comprising four bronze figures created by Marisol, was approved by a vote of 23 in favor, 0 opposed and 0 abstentions. A committee resolution to extend the installation of Ilona Granet's "Street Sign Project" was approved by a vote of 20 in favor, 3 opposed with 0 abstentions.

Hal Bromm presented two committee resolutions which were both approved by a vote of 22 in favor, 0 opposed with 0 abstentions. One related to the interrelationship between the Landmarks Preservation Commission and other City agencies, and the other dealt with procedures of the Buildings Department regarding demolition and alteration permits and their impact on proposed historic districts. He reported that no cooperation has been received from either the Buildings Department or the owner regarding the Bond Hotel.

New Business

Hal Bromm requested that monthly Executive Committee meetings be scheduled.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:20 PM.

WHEREAS: Community Board #1 opposes any concession operation on Pier 11 which will produce a "flea market-like" atmosphere due to lowered design standards, now

WHEREAS: The State Legislature has determined that the collapse of the City's school buildings is the result of systematic underinvestment in the City's schools by the Koch administration and its previous school chancellors, and

WHEREAS: The school construction legislation, conceived in the Assembly and introduced by Assemblymembers Siegel and Serrano and Speaker Miller requires the City to restore its schools to sound physical condition by January 1, 2000; and

WHEREAS: The Board of Education has completed its needs-based assessment of the work necessary to reach the legally mandated goal and will submit to the City a five-year capital plan setting forth a prioritized list of all the work which must be done to allow us to reach our goal on time, and

WHEREAS: The cost of the capital plan, representing the accrued cost of decades of neglect, is approximately \$10 billion, and

WHEREAS: The salvation of our school system requires that all the money necessary be invested now, this being the last chance in the century to give our children and the people who teach them the conditions they deserve, and

WHEREAS: The legislation requires the Mayor to propose, and the Board of Estimate and the City Council to adopt, a one-time, five-year appropriation to fund the capital plan as part of this year's capital budget cycle, now

THAT: Community Board #1 demands that the Five-Year School Buildings Capital Plan be fully funded this year, and

RE: **The Conklin Committee Report**

WHEREAS: The Conklin Committee Report, "New York The Historic City", proposes that the City Planning Commission and the Landmarks Preservation Commission work together, utilizing existing department policy guidelines and laws to achieve balanced zoning and development for both existing and potential historic districts, and

WHEREAS: The South Street Seaport Historic District continues to face large-scale development, as permitted by the current zoning which pre-dates the historic district designation, and these development plans have repeatedly been judged by the Landmarks Preservation Commission and the Community Board to be inappropriate to the historic district, and

WHEREAS: Both the LPC and the CPC are independently studying the Tribeca area as a potential historic district and a rezoned "Lower Broadway Corridor", and

WHEREAS: The geographical areas under study by the two agencies overlap, and

WHEREAS: The report states that the current Landmarks Law provides that "the Landmarks Preservation Commission may at any time make recommendations to the City Planning Commission with respect to amendments of the provisions of the zoning resolution applicable to improvements in historic districts." Further, "The Historic City Committee believes that the Commission must make use of this existing provision to encourage City Planning to adjust zoning provisions so that the zoning policy and district designations are consistent", and

WHEREAS: The report also states that the Department of City Planning has the ability to create "Special Purpose Districts", and that this "could be a useful tool in preserving the character of certain areas, particularly where neighborhood preservation is a desirable objective, but which are not of sufficient quality to merit historic district designation." Such a district could compliment and supplement the proposed Tribeca Historic District, enabling "neighborhood preservation" to occur, and

WHEREAS: The "Broadway Corridor" study was expanded westward to include a parking lot bounded by Reade, Hudson and Chambers Streets, and Mr. Abi Kalimian, General Partner in Kalabi Realty, has requested that Block 140, Lots 1, 3, 4 and 5, be upzoned from an FAR of 5 to FAR 10. (C.F.Q.R. #87-267M; ULURP #870157ZRM, 870158ZMM, 870759ZSM), and three of the four lots listed contain historically significant structures which contribute to the planned historic district, and

WHEREAS: Spot rezoning of this nature, inadvisable to begin with, and already opposed by Community Board #1, is amplified in its potentially detrimental effect by the location of this block within, and its relationship to, the proposed district, and

WHEREAS: The report recommends that the Landmarks Commission use the existing provision of the Landmarks Law to encourage the City Planning Commission to adjust zoning provisions so that zoning policy and historic district designations are consistent, and also, that the City's land use planning process should be revised so that a concern such as landmarks preservation can be addressed at the outset before development proposals are advanced; i.e., block 140, now

Community Board #1 requests that these two agencies immediately begin work together for the common good of the city and our community to realize one of the major recommendations of the Conklin Committee report, and opportunity that is particularly meaningful considering the current precarious status of this area, and

Community Board #1, urges that serious study be given to the creation of a "special purpose district" which would compliment and supplant the proposed Washington Market/Tribeca Historic District.
