

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (CERT)

New York City's CERTs are groups of community-based volunteers trained in disaster preparedness and emergency response. Organized through Community Boards, CERT members undergo an intensive, 11-week training course so they can prepare for and respond to local disasters.

MEDICAL RESERVE CORPS

The *NYC Department of Health and Mental Hygiene's (DOHMH) Medical Reserve Corps (MRC)* enhances New York City's emergency preparedness by ensuring that a trained group of volunteer health professionals is ready to respond to public health emergencies. The primary role of the MRC is to help distribute antibiotics or vaccines during a emergency that requires mass prophylaxis of a large number of New Yorkers. Volunteers may also be called upon to assist the City with mass sheltering operations or assist with medical surge capacity.
