The New York Athletic Club, through its Youth Athletic Council which was organized to encourage physical fitness among the youth of New York City, will sponsor four athletic meets with the cooperation of the Department of Parks on Sunday afternoons during July and August. The first of these meets for boys and girls 17 years of age and under will be held on July 8th at 2:00 P.M. at Red Hook Stadium quarter-mile track, Bay and Court Streets in Brooklyn.

Fifteen events for boys and girls are on the program for each meet as follows: boys' events, 100 lb. class= 50 yard dash; 110 lb. class= 60 yard dash; 120 lb. class= 70 yard dash; unlimited class= 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 440 yard run, half-mile, mile, running broad jump, running high jump, and 12 lb. shot put. Girls' events are 100 lb. class= 40 yard dash; 110 lb. class= 50 yard dash; 120 lb. slass= 60 yard dash and poteto race.

All of the above events will be open to all youngsters who desire to compete in them, irrespective of what organizations they are members of. However, boys and girls who have won prizes in P.S.A.L. or private high school meets or who are members of the Amateur Athletic Union are ineligible to compete in these events. This rule will be enforced in order to encourage youngsters who have never won prizes to participate in these meets. The above events will be duplicated on Saturday, July 22 at Triborough Stadium, Randall's Island; on August 5th at VanCortlandt Park Stadium, Bronx; and on August 19th at Victory Field in Queens.

In addition to these events for boys and girls 17 years of age and under, four handicap events open to athletes registered with the Metropolitan Association of the A.A.U. will be conducted. These events will be: on July 8th at Red Hook Stadium, 70 yard dash, 600 yard run and shot put for boys, and 50 yard dash for girls; on July 22nd at Triborough Stadium, 100 yard dash, 440 yard run, 2 mile, and 120 yard hurdle; on August 5th at VanCortlandt Park Stadium, 220 yard dash, one mile, running broad jump for boys, and 100 yard dash for girls; on August 19th at Victory Field, 100 yard dash, half-mile, 3 mile run, and running high jump.

The New York Athletic Club will award gold filled medals for first place, sterling silver medals for second place, and bronze medals for third place in each event.

No entry fee will be charged for entering any of these events, and the entire expense of furnishing prizes, and printing entry blanks and programs will be defrayed by the New York Athletic Club.

The organizing and conducting of the meets will be handled by the Recreation staff of the Department of Parks. Entry blanks may be secured and filed at neighborhood playgrounds and at Park Department headquarters in each of the boroughs:

The sports division of the program, which includes fourteen tournaments and contests, has started in neighborhood playgrounds of the five boroughs.

The event now in progress is a marbles tournament for boys and girls, sponsored by the New York Mirror. In July, under the same sponsorship, a softball tournament for boys will get under way, and six championship swimming meets for boys will be held in Outdoor Park Department pools. The swimming program also includes Junior and Senior Metropolitan A. A. U. Championship events for boys, and a Learn to Swim Campaign. The Learn to Swimm Campaign will start in July and continue through August. With the opening of its swimming pools and beaches last Wednesday, the Park Department is expecting extensive use of its recreational facilities during the coming summer months by millions of New Yorkers who will again spend their vacations in town. Spending a vacation at home is a contribution to victory in that it eliminates unessential travel and frees space for the transportation of the necessities of war. New York's recreational resources are boundless, and practically all faciliaties in the city parks are within easy reach of subway, bus, and trolley lines.

Swimming pools and beaches rate high in the favor of stay-at-home vacationers. Last summer 1,951,000 children and adults swam in the Park Department's seventeen outdoor pools, and eighty million more enjoyed the six municipal beaches. The pools, modern in design and sanitation, are located throughout the five boroughts in Manhattan they are Hamilton Fish Pool, Colonial Pool, Highbridge Pool, Thomas Jefferson Pool, 23 Street Pool, Carmine Street Pool, 60 Street Pool, and John Jag Pool; in Brooklyn, Sunset, McCarren, Betsy Head and Red Hook Pools; in the Pronx. Crotona Pool; in Queens, Astoria Pool and Flushing Meadow Park Amphithestre Pool; in Richmond, Faber and Tompkinsville Pools. Children under 14 years of age are admitted free of charge from 10:00 A.M. to 12:30 P.M. on weekdays and Saturdays. At other times there is a fee of nine cents for children under 12 years of age, and a charge of twenty-six cents for older children and adults.

There are ten golf courses in the parks. All of these are 18 hole. and are situated in Brooklyn at Dyker Beach; in the Bronx at Mosholu, Pelham, Split Rock, and VanCortlandt; in Queens at Clearview, Forest Park, and Kissena; in Richmond at Silver Lake and LaTourette. A season permit costs five dollars. A daily playing fee of seventy-five cents is charged from Monday to Friday; on Saturdays Sundays, and holidays the fee is one dollar. Last year over 445,000 rounds were played on the municipal courses.

For those who prefer tennis, there are over 500 courts ready for play. There is a permit charge of three dollars for this activity, entitling the permit holder to a season of play on the courts of the five boroughs.

Vacationers who are looking for quiet places amid natural surroundings will find many beauty spots in the parks, with boating and picnicking facilities. Many of these locations are equipped with fireplaces for preparing picnic meals. Some of the larger areas with such accommodations are Alley Pond and Cunningham Parks in Queens; Plum Beach on the Belt Parkway in Brooklyn; Pelham Bay Park in the Bronx; Riverside Park at 180 Street in Manhattan; and LaTourette Park in Richmond.

154 baseball diamonds and 293 softball diamonds are ready and waiting for the ball playing public, which last year amounted to 3,000,000. For those who enjoy changing scenery with their recreation, there are 29 bicycle paths and 70 miles of bridle paths in the parks.

In addition to these and other type areas designed for specialized use, the Park Department operates 492 playgrounds with facilities for taking care of recreational needs from infancy to old age. Facilities range all the way from kindergarten swings for tiny tots to tree shaded checker tables popular with old-timers. Some of the items included in the play areas designed for teen age boys and girls are 1,064 handball courts, 398 basketball courts, 443 horseshoe pitching courts, and 189 volleyball courts.

For the very youngest vacationers, there are small children's play areas, equipped with 7,000 large and small swings, 900 slides, and 1,800 see-saws. The youngsters also have sand pits, roller skating areas, and 192 wading pools at their disposal.

There is a healthful vacation for you right in your own municipal parks, no matter what your age or recreational preference; you can stick to your pet activities, or discover some new ones. Father Knickerbocker has tucked something into his park system for each of his children.

From May 30th to June 30th the pools will be open for weekends only, and from July 1st until the end of the season, they will be open daily with the following operating schedule: On weekdays and Saturdays from 10 A.M. to 12:30 P.M., there will be a free period for children under 14 years of age during which hours no adults will be admitted to the pool area. After 1 P.M. on weekdays and all day Sundays and Holidays, there will be a 9¢ charge for children under 12 years of age and a 26¢ charge for older children and adults. These charges include tax.

Groups in swimming, diving, contests and water shows will be organized at all pools. Classes in life saving and first aid will also be included in the Aquatic Program in addition to the yearly "Learn to Swim" campaign which will be held during July and August.

Orchard Beach, Pelham Bay Park in the Bronx; Jacob Riis Park Beach and Rockaway Beach on the Rockaway Peninsula, Queens; Coney Island Beach, Brooklyn; and South Beach and Wolfe's Pond Park on Staten Island will also open for bathers on Memorial Day, May 30th. Bathhouse accommodations at Jacob Riis Park and Orchard Beach will be open weekends only until June 30th.

At Orchard Beach there is a total of 7796 lockers for bathhouse patrons and parking space is provided for 6,000 cars. At Jacob Riis Park the bathhouse accomodates 10,000 people and the parking space 14,000 cars. Parking at both beaches will be 25¢ per car, bathhouse fees: 15¢ for children's lockers and 25¢ for adult lockers. Dressing rooms are available at Jacob Riis Park for a fee of 50¢ per person. Recreational areas at Jacob Riis. Park and Orchard Beach providing shuffleboard, paddle tennis and handball are available to the public at 10¢ per person, per half hour.

At Jacob Riis Park there is also an eighteen hole pitch putt golf course at which a charge of 50¢ is made for each round of golf, which includes clubs. A 50¢ deposit is required on golf balls. A special schedule of events is planned for Jacob Riis Park; there will be calisthenics on the beach daily:

Beach chairs and umbrellas may be rented at Orchard Beach and Jacob Riis Park at a nominal charge and beach shops are provided where bathing accessories can be purchased.

Many fighters who later became prominent, including Pete Burns, Lou Perfetti, Tim Quinn, Paul Berlenbach, Jim Burns, Jim Parkhill, and Joe Spatola, got their start through his tutelage.

The Department extends a cordial invitation to his friends to attend the boxing finals which, coincidentally, will be held on the first anniversary of his death, and to witness the awarding of the trophy.

One thousand entries have been received by the Department of Parks for the Annual Handcraft Contest sponsored by the New York Community Trust. With April 21st set as the closing date for entries, the contest has all the appearances of developing into the largest one held yet.

Some of the articles which the early contestants have brought in are toys, clothing, junior furniture, pictures, sewing boxes, rugs, and lamps. The youngsters display ingenuity in their handcraft, giving scrap material new life by incorporating it in useful and decorative articles.

The articles will be displayed in thirty-one district exhibits to be held throughout the city from April 23rd to April 28th. At these shows winning articles will be selected for display in boroug wide exhibitions, where selections of winners will be made again. The borough-wide shows will be held from May 1st to May 12th as follows: Manhattan - Park Entrance Galleries, Metropolitan Museum of Art; Brooklyn - Sculpture Court, Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences; Bronx - Lobby, Bronx County Building; Queens - Lobby, Queens Borough Hall; Richmond - Staten Island Institute of Arts and Sciences.

These five exhibitions will be followed by a city-wide display at the New York Public Library, 42 Street and Fifth Avenue, from May 15th to May 24th, in which the best articles from the five boroughs will be displayed, and city-wide winners will be selected. In selecting winning articles, the judges will consider the usefulness, originality, and workmanship displayed in the item. The competition will be divided into three age groups: juniors 8-11 years, intermediates 12-14 years, and seniors 15-17 years. 

JOINT STATEMENT BY THE INTRODUCERS OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AFFECTING THE STATE FOREST PRESERVE.

Our greatest natural resource available for public recreation is the Forest Preserve. The State has 2,172,000 acres in the Adirondacks and 232,000 in the Catskills, with as fine mountain, forest and lake country as there is anywhere in the United States. Our State Constitution does not permit the use of this immense acreage for recreation excepting under the most rigid restrictions. The Constitution declares that the Forest Preserve shall be "forever wild forest land" and forbids even the most elementary improvements to make these lands accessible and usable by campers, sportsmen and vacationists generally.

This constitutional declaration was made because of public insistence half a century ago that the Forest Preserve should no longer be exploited by private waterpower, lumber and other commercial interests. Public sentiment on this subject is just as insistent today. It is prompted by a sound instinct to keep intact and unspoiled for the people what they have inherited. On the other hand, there is no reason why the Forest Preserve should be locked up against limited and controlled recreational use by the people themselves. It should not be necessary to amend the Constitution every time the State wants to provide the camping, trails and recreation and access facilities such as are furnished in the largest State and national parks.

A very involved and controversial amendment, going much further than was necessary or desirable, was submitted to the people in the fall of 1932, and was defeated. The defeat of this amendment was due in a large measure to its length, obscurity, and broad terms. We believe that today the people of the State will welcome a less drastic change. We cannot afford to restrict the use of the forest preserve to extremists who insist on keeping it a complete wilderness accessible and available only to those who have the experience, toughness and leisure to enjoy it without the elementary conveniences.

and facilities required by the average vacationist and his family. Hundreds of thousands of such vacationists are today deprived of the perfectly innocent use of the forest preserve for camping vacations, hiking and other outdoor enjoyment because they cannot sleep out in the open or in lean-tos, and cannot live in completely wild forest land.

There is every evidence of enormously increased recreational demands after the war. We are sure that there are many returning servicemen who have been leading active outdoor lives, including those suffering from disabilities traceable to the war, all of whom should be given preference in the use of the proposed camping and recreation.

If this amendment is passed at the present session of the legislature, it can be fully discussed by the people between now and 1947 which is the earliest date at which it can receive its second passage. We can, if necessary, even change the amendment in 1946, and still pass it in 1947.

A draft of the proposed Constitutional Amendment follows: CONCURRENT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND ASSEMBLY

Proposing an amendment to section one of article fourteen of the Constitution, in relation to the use of the forest preserve for recreation.

- Section 1. Resolved (if the Senate concur), That section one of article fourteen of the constitution be amended to read as follows:
- l. The lands of the State, now owned or hereafter acquired, constituting the forest preserve as now fixed by law, shall be forever kept as wild forest lands. They shall not be leased, sold or exchanged, or be taken by any corporation, public, or private, nor shall the timber be sold, removed or destroyed. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the state from constructing, completing and maintaining any highway heretofore specifically authorized by constitutional amendment, nor from constructing and maintaining not more than twenty miles of ski trails thirty to eighty feet wide on the north, east and northwest slopes of Whiteface Mountain in Essex County. Nor shall anything contained in this section be construed to prevent any measures necessary to protect the forest

maintaining paths, trails, campsites and camping facilities designed to render the forest preserve more accessible and useful to the public for healthful recreation, including the necessary clearings therefor, nor to prevent the improvement by the state of existing public roads in the forest preserve. Recreation facilities shall be maintained for the benefit of all the people on equal terms except that preference may by law be given to veterans.

RESOLVED (if the Senate concur), That the foregoing amendment be referred to the first regular legislative session convening
after the next succeeding general election of members of the Assembly
and, in conformity with section one of article nineteen of the
constitution, be published for three months previous to the time of
such election.

Trust Handcraft Contest for boys and girls under 18 years of age. Handcraft is a
popular year round feature of the recreation program in the Park playgrounds, and
the annual competition gives youngsters an opportunity to match skill and ingenuity
and to exchange ideas in arts and crafts.

Competition will be in three age divisions: juniors 8 - 11 years, intermediates 12 - 14 years, seniors 15 - 17 years. In each age division articles will be judged in five classes: articles for the home, generally useful articles, hobbies, airplanes, and needlecrafts. Articles will be judged on the besis of usefulness, originality, and workmanship. Some of the novel articles entered last year were model automobiles, articles of children's clothing made from salvaged scrap materials, Pennsylvania Dutch cradles, hand painted sewing boxes, hat and mitten sets, stuffed toys, metal foil plaques, small pieces of furniture, and crocheted and knitted clothing.

A series of local handcraft contests will be held in thirty-one districts throughout the five boroughs. The best articles from each of these local shows will be selected for the borough-wide contests, which will in turn be followed by one large city-wide exhibition in which the best articles from all boroughs will be displayed. Prizes will be awarded by the New York Community Trust in all exhibitions. In the district shows, the winners of first place in each class will receive \$5. in War Saving Stamps. In the borough shows, prizes of \$10. and \$5. in War Saving Stamps will be awarded for first and second places respectively. There are daily swim sessions for children at eight indoor Park pools in Manhattan, from 2:00 to 6:00 P.M. Monday through Friday, and from 10:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M. on Saturdays. The Brooklyn pool at Bedford and Metropolitan Avenues is open from 1:00 to 9:00 P.M. on weekdays, and from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on Saturdays; and is reserved on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays for girls, and on all other days for boys. In Manhattan there are three such gyms, 342 East 54 Street, 35 West 134 Street, and Thomas Jefferson Park, 111 Street and First Avenue; in Brooklyn classes are held at McCarren Park, Driggs Avenue and Lorimer Street; in the Bronx at two locations, Crotona Park, 173 Street and Fulton Avenue, and St.Mary's Park, 146 Street and St.Ann's Avenue; in Queens at Jackson Heights Playground, 84 Street and 30 Avenue; and in Richmond at Faber Park, Richmond Terrace and Faber Street.

All carnival programs will consist of racing events for play, and ground boys and girls under 18 years of age: juvenile boys 75 yards, juvenile girls 60 yards, junior boys 100 yards, junior girls 75 yards, intermediate boys 100 yards and 440 yards, intermediate girls 100 yards and 220 yards. In addition to these events, Sunday's carnival will also include events for members of the Middle Atlantic Skating Association, and a fifteen minute exhibition of figure skating and dancing by members of the Manhattan Figure Skating Club, who practice at the City Building rink in Flushing Meadow Park every Sunday morning.

Medals will be awarded by the New York Community Trust at borough carnivals and at the City-wide finals to skaters placing first, second, and third,



During the past three months, 1415 cords of firewood, made available by the hurricane, have been taken from the stock piles placed in 22 parks throughout the city. This wood has been taken for personal use by all who cared to come and get it.

Six hundred playground boys and girls have signed up to run in the elimination track meets sponsored by the New York Community Trust, which the Department of Parks will conduct in each of the five boroughs on Saturday, February 3rd at 2:00 P.M. Youngsters who place in these five meets will be eligible to compete in the city-wide meet at Madison Square Garden on February 17th at 1:30 P.M.

The program at each elimination meet will consist of eight events for playground boys and girls under 18 years of age, arranged according to weights. In the 100 lb. class, the events are a 50 yard dash for boys, 40 yard dash for girls; in the 120 lb. class, a 60 yard dash and a quarter-mile relay for boys, 50 yard dash and 220 yard relay for girls; in the unlimited class for boys, an 880 yard run and a half-mile relay. Entry blanks for these events may be obtained at all Park play-grounds.

The five elimination meets will be held in armories. Manhattan and Richmond will hold meets at the 22nd Regiment Armory, 168 Street and Broadway; Brooklyn at the 13th Regiment Armory, Summer and Jefferson Avenues; the Bronx at the 8th Regiment Armory, Kingsbridge Road and Jerome Avenue; and Queens at the 4th Regiment Armory, 168 Street and 93 Avenue, Jamaica.

In addition to the city-wide championships in playground events, the program of the Madison Square Garden meet will include PSAL, AAU, and private and parochial high school events. These added events will be: for PSAL, one mile high school relay and a 60 yard dash; for private and parochial high schools, a two mile high school relay. In all school events, only one entry from each school may compete in each event. Events for AAU members will consist of a 60 yard dash handicap and an 880 yard run.

At borough meets New York Community Trust medals will be awarded to youngsters placing first, second, and third. First, second, and third place winners at the city-wide meet will also receive medals.

Two hundred seventy-six boys have entered the Department of Parks' Boxing Tournament, part of the New York Community Trust Winter Sports

Tournament now being conducted in parks and playgrounds throughout the city. The Boxing Tournament is open to boys 14 through 17 years of age.

Eight sets of elimination bouts will be conducted in gymnasia in the five boroughs, and will be followed by quarter and semi-finals at Lost Battalion Hall, Queens, on March 19th, 20th, and 26th. The city-wide finals, in which twelve championships will be at stake, will be held at the 69th Regiment Armory, Manhattan, on April 6th.

Entries are being accepted at Park gyms where entrants may receive boxing instructions and train. These gyms are at 342 East 54 Street, 35 West 134 Street, and Thomas Jefferson Park, 111 Street and First Avenue in Manhattan; at McCarren Park, Driggs Avenue and Lovimer Street in Brooklyn; at Crotona Park, 173 Street and Fulton Avenue, and St. Mary's Park, 149 Street and St. Ann's Avenue in the Bronx; at Jackson Heights Playground, 84 Street and 30 Avenue in Queens; and at Faber Park, Richmond Terrace and Faber Street in Richmond.

Boxers will be divided according to age into a junior division for boys 14 and 15 years of age, and a senior division for boys 16 and 17 years of age. Age groups will be divided further into weight classes. There will be seven classes in the junior division: 90 lb., 100 lb., 105 lb., 112 lb., 118 lb., 126 lb., and 135 lh. Seniors will be divided into 118 lb., 126 lb., 135 lb., 140 lb., and 147 lb. classes.

Medals will be awarded by the New York Community Trust to the winners and runners-up at each gymnasium, and to the winners and runners-up at the city-wide finals.



Seven hundred entries have been received for the ice skating races to be held on Park lakes in the five boroughs on Sunday, January 7th at 2:00 P.M. The carnivals, which are sponsored by the New York Community Trust in conjunction with the Department of Parks, will consist of racing events for boys and girls under 18 years of age.

The events will be conducted at 72 Street Lake in Central Park,
Manhattan; Prospect Park Lake in Brooklyn; VanCortlandt Park Lake in the Bronx;
Bowne Park Lake in Queens; and Martling's Pond. Clove Lake Park in Richmond.

There will be eight events on each carnival program, divided according to age: for juvenile boys 9 to 11 years, 75 yards; juvenile girls, 60 yards; for junior boys 12, 13, 14 years, 100 yards; junior girls 75 yards; for intermediate boys 15, 16, 17 years, 100 yards and 440 yards; intermediate girls, 100 yards and 220 yards.

Youngsters who have been unable to file entry blanks will be permitted to participate if they report to the lakes on Sunday afternoon at 1:30 P.M. and submit their names to the officials in charge.

The first five winners in each event will represent their boroughs in the city-wide carnival to be held in Central Park on Sunday, January 14th at 2:00 P.M. Medals will be awarded to the first, second, and third place winners in each event at the borough carnivals. At the city-wide finals, medals will be awarded to those placing first, second, and third. In addition to events for playground boys and girls, the program for the city-wide carnival will also include races for members of the Middle Atlantic Skating Association.






The annual Christmas exhibit of the season's flowers is on exhibition in the Greenhouse in Prospect Park West and 9 Street, Brooklyn.



STATEMENT BY ROBERT MOSES ON CONSTRUCTION COST

In a recent statement Commissioner Robert Moses said:

"There is altogether too much loose talk about prohibitive construction prices and bids. Prices and wages have risen. Contractors in many cases are not bidding, or have offered estimates which are so high that prospective builders, public, semi-public and private, have been driven into hiding. On the other hand, I have personally received bids for work not only in heavy construction, but involving buildings, which have been reasonable and fair in the light of present conditions, and some which have been fairly close to 1939-1940 figures. Often such bids are obtained as the result of a conference with labor leaders, material men, and contractors in advance of advertising.

"Only the seventh son of a seventh son knows just what the situation will be three months from now, bearing in mind that nothing much happens at least in the northerly climate in mid-winter, and that by early spring those who have been hibernating and living on their fat will come out into the sunlight looking pretty thin and hungry and ready to do a whole lot of things which they spurned only a few months before.

"In the meantime no good purpose is served by belly-aching, spreading rumors and gloomy prophesies, and driving out of the construction market those who have plans and money to spend, those who make materials, the workmen on and back of the jobs, and the contractors who have to take the risks. If the gossips and loose-talkers will get ready for a big early spring construction program at reasonable prices, such a program will be almost certainly realized. This is a pretty resilient country and we will be back at work before long."

The Park Department announces that the Annual Fall Chrysanthemum Show in the Prospect Park Greenhouse will open on Sunday, November 4, 1945 at 10:00 A.M.

The Greenhouse is located at Prospect Park West and Ninth Street, Brooklyn and may be reached by way of the I.R.T. subway, Grand Army Plaza Station - The Independent subway, 7th Avenue Station and by the Vanderbilt and Smith Street carlines, Ninth Street stop, or by automobile direct to the Greenhouse by way of the east drive in Prospect Park.

The exhibit will be open every day from 10:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. for three weeks and the Park Department extends a cordial invitation to view the display.

More than four thousand pots of chrysanthemums will be on exhibition. The ground bed is laid out in groups of various formations with the popular large bloom varieties in all shades of pink, yellow, red and bronze. Some of the attractive plants are the Pocketts, John S. Bush, Turners, Rise of the Day and the Melba. Surrounding this feature of the display, banked on the sides of the Show House are numerous varieties in smaller size chrysanthemums in 75 varieties, such as the Pompons, the Anemone and the single Daisy tpys.

In the class of varieties in all shades of bronze, red, yellow and white, some of the outstanding chrysanthemums to be exhibited are the Crimson Red, Purple Queen, Red Rover, Orchid Beauty, Cleopatra and New York.

The cross country course at VanCortlandt Park in the Bronx is a mecca these fall afternoons, for long distance runners training for various championship events which are to be held during the next month.

The competitive season opened last Saturday morning with the holding of the ninth annual N.Y.U. Inter-scholastic Cross Country Run, in which close to 400 boys from 57 high schools competed. Immediately after the finish of the race, a contest for second team boys was held in which 216 starters representing 28 high schools covered the two and a quarter mile course.

The Public School Athletic League cross country championship will be held on next Saturday, October 27th at 10:00 A.M. Over 200 boys from the New York City high schools will compete in this race. Among the schools having exceptionally large entries, will be Stuyvesant, George Washington and Haaren of Manhattan; Boys, Lincoln, Erasmus, Manual Training, Brooklyn Tech and New Utrecht of Brooklyn; Monroe, Morris, Clinton and Science of the Bronx; Bryant, Adams, Jamaica, Newtown, Bayside and Flushing of Queens; and Curtis, New Dorp and Port Richmond of Staten Island.

On Saturday, November 3rd, at 10:30 A.M., 500 runners are expected to face the starter's gun and run over the Parade Grounds and hills of VanCortlandt Park in the Inter-scholastic Race sponsored by the New York Athletic Club. High school runners from all over the metropolitan area have already entered this event.

Four runs are scheduled for Saturday, November 10th. The opener, which starts at 10:00 A.M. will be the Vocational High School race

in which about 200 boys are expected to compete. This will be followed at 11:00 A.M. by the Heptagonal Championship of the I.C.A.A.A.A. in which representatives of the Ivy League schools and Army and Navy will compete. The Catholic High Schools Championship will follow at 11:30 A.M. in which approximately 300 runners will start. The final run of the day will start at 2:30 P.M., when athletes entered in the Junior Metropolitan A.A.U. Championship will toe the starting line.

Two events are scheduled for Saturday, November 17th: the Private High Schools A.A. Championship at 10:30 A.M., and the I.C.A.A.A. Championship at 11:00 A.M. The cross country season on the Bronx course will end on the following day, Sunday, November 18th, with the Senior Metropolitan A.A.U. run scheduled to start at 2:30 P.M.

The Park Department's cross country courses in all boroughs are used extensively for training by high school and college track teams. The Brooklyn course at the Parade Grounds, Parkside and Coney Island Avenues, is the training ground for Bishop Loughlin, St. Augustine, Manual Training, Erasmus, Hamilton, and Xavier High Schools, and Brooklyn College. DeLaSalle High School uses the running track at 74th Street and Riverside Drive in Manhattan. In Queens, John Adams and Newtown High Schools work out on the track at Victory Field, Woodhaven Boulevard and Myrtle Avenue in Forest Park; and in Richmond, Port Richmond High School trains at Clove Lakes Park.

Sixty-one varieties of tulips will be planted. Of these, there will be: 30 varieties of Darwin; 2 varieties of Parrot; 1 of Rembrandt, "Cordell Hull"; 16 varieties of Cottage, and 12 varieties of Breeder. The colors cover a wide range from deep crimsons, purples and blacks through the medium tones of orange, yellow and rose, to the light tones of yellow, white and pink, with countless variations of all these colors.

The origin of the garden tulip is unknown. Tulip seeds were first introduced into Europe from Persia and Turkey in the middle ages and have been planted by all civilized nations since that time. Holland, since the 15th Century, has developed bulbs to a high degree and has introduced many new varieties to the horticultural trade.

Two million chrysanthemum blooms massed in colorful and vivid display throughout the city are now flowering in New York City's Third Annual Outdoor Chrysanthemum Display, the Department of Parks announced today. These flowers are now on view in five park areas in New York City: The Central Park Conservatory Gardens at Fifth Avenue and 105th Street; The Plaza at Fifth Avenue and 59th Street; Bryant Park at Sixth Avenue and 42nd Street; Riverside Park at Riverside Drive and 106th Street; Bowling Green Park; and Cadman Plaza in Brooklyn.

These permanent plantings are the gift of Mrs. Albert D. Lasker, of New York City, to the Department of Parks in memory of her Mother, and are known as the Sara J. Woodard Memorial Chrysanthemum Plantings. Mrs. Wood 1, who died in New York City on January 8, 1940, was one of the founders of two public parks in Watertown, Wisconsin, and a member of the Park Association of New York City, Inc.

Thousands of visitors to the parks, as well as the people in the surrounding office buildings, hospitals and apartment houses, have enjoyed this dramatic and unique outdoor flower show for the past two years. Planted solidly in beds, some of them over 250 feet long, the flowers range in color from white through pale yellow to blue to pink to brilliant red, and the plants range in size from the small dwarf varieties to plants more than three feet high and three feet in spread. Bursting into bloom in spite of early frosts and at the season of the year when other flowers are withered and gone, New York City's Annual Outdoor Chrysanthemum Display is the largest and most spectacular outdoor mass planting of these chrysanthemums in the country.

Inspired by the beauty and success of the New York City

plantings, Mrs. Lasker has distributed since February 1944 over three million seeds from these chrysanthemums for use as War Memorial Planting in more than one hundred communities all over the country. Successful plantings are already established by the Park Departments of New Orleans and Niagara Falls and at Radcliffe College, Duke University and many other communities. In March 1945, Mrs. Lasker sent out seeds in answer to requests from 44 Veterans' Hospitals, 35 City Park Departments, 76 Colleges and Universities, 6 Housing Authorities and 15 Garden Clubs. It only requires one half teaspoon of seed to plant an acre of chrysanthemums, so it is anticipated that large-scale plantings will bloom this Fall for the first time in many other communities.

Of special interest among the requests for seed received by Mrs. Lasker is the one from Mr. W. D. Grant, Supervisor of Parks in General Douglas MacArthur's home town of Little Rock, Arkansas, who wished to start a planting in honor of the General. His request for such was granted.

All the plants in New York City's display are seedings and cuttings from the "Chicago" strain of winter-hardy chrysanthemums developed by Dr. E. J. Kraus, Chairman of the Botany Department of the University of Chicago. Dr. Kraus, stimulated by the desire to create a flower that could be used by the amateur gardener to extend the blooming period of a garden by as much as six weeks, began his experiments in 1934. He wanted to develop a chrysanthemum whose flowers would withstand severe frosts, and whose plants would survive sub-zero temperatures.

Each year thousands of seedlings were grown and out of these fifty to one hundred outstanding plants were selected for further testing. In the Fall of 1941 twelve varieties were selected and made available to the public through nurserymen and commercial growers. In the Spring of 1942, Mrs. Lasker gave the seeds and the funds to establish the original plantings at the Conservatory Gardens and at Bryant Park to the New York City Park

Department. The additional plantings were made in the succeeding years.

The Park Department has found this chrysanthemum during the past three years, one of the few flowers that will bear up under heavy frost, and the only plant having a wide range of color that is suitable in this section of the country for mass planting. It is hoped that each year additional communities will take up the idea of making these plants as a simple, living and beautiful tribute to the heros of the war. Anyone interested in doing so may secure seeds through commercial growers or by writing to Mrs. Albert D. Lasker, Chrysler Building, New York City.

Manhattan announce that with the assistance of the Commissioner of Marine and Aviation substantial progress has been made in their efforts to open to the public the privately-owned waterfront along the Franklin D. Roosevelt Drive between East 51st Street and East 54th Street, in the Borough of Manhattan. The property owners in this section, the Beekman-Campanile and the River House apartments have cooperated with the city by agreeing to surrender their exclusive rights to the waterfront. Formal agreements have been submitted to the Board of Estimate and 1t has been urged to give its immediate approval.

At the present time, the public waterfront promenade along this section of the Drive extends from the underpass at East 49th Street and comes to a dead end at 51st Street. The portion from 51st Street to 54th Street has been restricted to the residents of the adjacent apartment houses who have made little use of the area. The acquisition of the new section of waterfront property will permit the extension of the existing public promenade from 51st Street to 54th Street. A new pedestrian overpass at 54th Street will be constructed, thus giving access to the neighborhood at the northerly end of the promenade and also providing circulation for pedestrians. The present private bridge over the Drive from the Campanile apartments will be removed and the bridge from the River House will be extended over the promenade to the private dock which will still be maintained. This work, when completed as part of the Postwar Program, will provide a highly desirable addition to the public waterfront.

TO EDITORS AND EDITORIAL WRITERS:

Attached is copy of a report with illustrations summarizing what has beeb accomplished in the New York City park system during the past twelve years.

The booklet is a precise, condensed, accurate report of expansion, rehabilitation and improved public service financed with city, state, and federal funds through contributions from the Triborough Bridge Authority and other agencies, institutions, and individuals.

After years of neglect and indifference to the city's recreation needs, the program of park and parkway improvements began with the first LaGuardia administration in 1934 when special legislation consolidated the then five separate borough park departments and made it possible for the head of the state park system to act as city park commissioner as well as to hold additional unpaid city positions. In this way coordination of city and state parks, parkways and arterial and related developments heretofore impossible was brought about.

At first the depression of the early thirties stimulated the program; them the war interrupted it. New facilities have been erected in every part of the city, and New York City today heads American cities in municipal recreation.

Because of reduced budgets and insufficient personnel, material, and equipment, and other war restrictions, it has been impossible to maintain an acceptable standard of public service during the past three war years. This lowering of standards of upkeep and shortage of manpower have encouraged vandalism and disregard for public property. An adequate budget and a program of emergency repairs and rehabilitation are needed immediately. We also need many more policemen.

The report also outlines a flexible program of useful and necessary postwar work designed to expedite employment after the war so that leaf raking and made work need not be resorted to because of lack of detailed plans and specifications. The projects range in size from large park and parkway construction jobs

to small park buildings and small playgrounds in neglected neighborhoods. All these projects are necessary parts of a carefully planned program of park and parkway expansion and rehabilitation coordinated with other arterial improvements in the metropolitan area, and with housing, school and other construction involving recreation.

A greatly increased demand for recreation is enticipated. This demand will come from men and women in the armed services and in war production who have become accustomed to strenuous exercise, as well as from whoms who have had little leisure during the war period. Our postwar program of park expansion and rehabilitation will meet their needs.

The ice and roller rinks of the New York City Building, Flushing Meadow Park, Queens, will reopen for the 1945-46 season on Friday, September 28.

The roller rink, 150 feet long and 116 feet wide, has been resurfaced for the new season. The ice surface, 178 feet long and 116 feet wide, will be maintained in the same excellent condition as in previous years.

Special programs for both ice and roller rinks have been planned and patrons will find an interesting and diversified program for every evening session of the week. Music planned and played for skaters will be furnished again this year by Walter Litt at the console of the electric organ.

There will be daily skating periods from 2:30 to 5:30 in the afternoon and from 7:30 to 11 in the evening. Admission charges are twenty-two cents for afternoons and forty-three cents in the evenings. In addition to these sessions there will be the usual free period for youngsters under fourteen years of age every Saturday morning from 9:30 to 12 Noon. The admission price includes the use of roller skates and Federal tax. A charge of fifty cents is made for the rental of ice skates, while shoe rollers can be rented for twenty-five cents.

There is no charge for checking wearing apparel. On the skating floor there is a food bar where food and refreshments are sold at reasonable prices.

In accordance with the department's policy, admission is free to members of the armed forces.

destroyed in the hurricane of September, 1944. At that time 24,400 trees were destroyed and 17,220 trees were damaged along the city streets and in the parks. Although a part of the work was done by contract, the major portion was carried out by departmental forces with assistance from other city departments.

\$564,236.68, were made by the Board of Estimate to remove the destroyed trees and to straighten and brace those which were damaged but worth salvaging. Seven thousand seven hundred and twenty trees were straightened under contracts let by the Park Department. The balance of 9,500 salvageable trees were straightened and braced with Park forces and equipment. This salvage work required 280,000 board feet of lumber, 26,000 counds of wire, and 9,000 pounds of undercured garden hose, at a total cost for materials of \$24,000.

Under additional contracts, 12,318 trees were removed from the city streets. Upon completion of contract work, there were still thousands of trees left to be removed. The street tree work was completed by the Park Department with the assistance of men and equipment assigned from the maintenance departments of the various Borough Presidents and from the Department of Sanitation. The removal of destroyed trees in parks throughout the city was left to the Park Department which, with the help of rented compressors, cranes and trucks, has been gradually clearing up the fallen trees and debris over the past four months. There still remain today in the parks 150 trees to be cut up and removed and 3,150 stumps to be removed. This work will be completed by December 1, 1945.

There have been many requests from citizens for the replacement of trees destroyed by the hurricane. The emergency appropriations were totally inadequate even to remove ϵ^* , the destroyed trees. There was no appropriation for the planting of new trees, nor is there any provision in the city's annual budget for the planting of street trees. Under these circumstances such planting must be done by the abutting property owners.

Results of Knickerbocker Handicap Golf Tournament to be held at Split Rock Golf Course on Sunday, September 23, may be secured by telephoning the Split Rock Golf House, CIty Island 8 - 1258, after 6:00 P.M.

75,000,000 visits were made to Park Department recreation facilities during the summer, according to an announcement made by Park officials. This large attendance indicates that New Yorkers complied with the request of government officials to spend their 1945 vacations at home to reduce the strain on transportation facilities and conserve gasoline.

Over 64,000,000 people used New York City's six municipal beaches during the summer. An additional million enjoyed the Park Department's seventeen outdoor swimming pools; this includes 198,138 youngsters who were admitted free of charge during the morning period reserved for children. In the annual Learn to Swim Campaign conducted at all pools, 4,800 youngsters were taught to swim. Three series of swimming meets were conducted during July and August: six Journal-American sponsored meets for girls, six New York Mirror sponsored meets for boys, and twenty meets for boys, girls, men and women sponsored by the New York Community Trust. Junior and Senior Metropolitan A.A.U. Casapionship events and special events for service men were conducted in conjunction with these three swimming tournaments. Three thousand youngsters took part in the meets, many swimming in competition for the first time.

339,000 rounds of golf were played on the ten municipal golf courses during the season. Local and City-wide tournaments were conducted for men, women, and junior boys, and prizes were donated by the Park Association of New York City. A city-wide tennis tournament in which 1,300 players entered, was held on Park courts throughout the five boroughs.

. 14,500 children participated in the Annual Summer Sports Tournament, a special program of sports activities for girls and boys under 18 years of age, sponsored by the New York Community Trust. This tournament included handball, horseshoe pitching, swimming, paddle tennis, shuffleboard, table tennis, checkers, jacks, and model yachting. Individual contests were conducted in each of these activities, starting with elimination matches in 492 neighborhood playgrounds, then proceeding with inter-playground, inter-district, and inter-borough play-offs to determine Citywide Champions.

6,500 boys took part in a softball tournament in the Mirror league, and many thousands of additional players used the 447 softball and baseball diamonds for daily games and exercise; providing a source of recreation for a great number of spectators.

Among the most popular summer activities designed for youngsters were the marionette and magic shows. 102 magic shows and 110 marionette shows played to young audiences in playgrounds all over the city during the summer. Both travelling shows will be making fall appearances soon.

Another popular children's activity was the annual dance festivel held in each of the five boroughs. Two thousand girls were taught folk, ballet, and

their own costumes for the affairs. 30,000 parents and friends enjoyed these demonstrations by the youngsters.

In addition to these special features, the daily recreation program consisting of arts, crafts, drama, dancing, sports, story telling, singing and group games, was carried on in the playgrounds by a staff of 650 playground directors who organized, supervised, and promoted these activities. The play program included basketball, volleyball, softball, handball, shuffleboard, paddle tennis, horseshoe pitching, the use of swings, see-saws, slides, exercise units, and the ever popular wading pool. Many New Yorkers also enjoyed boating on the lakes, riding on bridle and bicycle paths, bowling on the green, playing cricket, fishing, and model yachting at special areas provided for these sports.

A full season of concerts and dancing was provided on the musical side of the summer recreation program. A series of fifty-four Name Band Dances which concluded last Friday at Prospect Park, was sponsored by Consolidated Edison System Companies, and was enjoyed by more than 300,000 dancers and listeners. Such well known leaders as Clyde Lucas, Mitchell Ayres, Bill Bardo, Shorty Sherock, and Van Alexander led their orchestras for these public dances. The Name Band program was climaxed by a dance contest in which eliminations were held in all boroughs, and finals on the Mall in Central Park before an audience of 20,000 spectators.

Square dancing, which enjoys growing popularity, was sponsored on two evenings a week by Pepsi-Cola Company. 8,000 dancers do-si-doed every Monday night at Riverside Drive at 103rd Street, and several thousand more did likewise at Saturday afternoon hoe-downs on the Mall in Central Park. Square dancing on the Mall will continue on Saturday afternoons until September 22nd. Other outdoor dances, sponsored by various organizations in local playgrounds throughout the city, were attended by 150,000 people.

Lovers of concert music were well provided for in the past summer. The Goldman Band, marking its twenty-eighth season in the parks, rendered sixty concerts for approximately 500,000 listeners in Central and Prospect Parks. The City Amateur Symphony Orchestra, under the leadership of Hon. Leopold Prince, gave six Saturday night concerts on the Mall, entertaining 36,000. Four Naumburg Memorial Concerts were provided with conductors Malcolm Holmes, Emanuel Balaban, Richard Bales, and Nicolas Rescigno sharing the honors. Through the courtesy of Local 802 of the American Federation of Musicians, a program of thirty concerts was presented to the public, attracting a total audience of 90,000.

Last summer's Park program, with its provision for all ages, tastes, and recreational preferences is typical of the Park Department's never ending effort to provide a program of healthful activities with universal appeal. With a summer of service behind it, the Park Department is looking forward to an integrated program of fall activities for young and old.

Thirty-five top-ranking paddle-tennis players from the Park play-grounds of the five boroughs will meet this Saturday, September 15th, to determine the City-wide Champions in the Summer Sports Tournament being conducted by the Department of Parks and sponsored by the New York Community Trust. The players in Saturday's championship matches are the survivors of a tournament in which over 2,000 players competed.

The tournament is being conducted in four divisions: junior boys and junior girls for players 12, 13 and 14 years of age, and senior boys and senior girls for those 15, 16 and 17 years of age. Championships in each division are scheduled for 1:30 P. M. on Saturday at the following locations:



One thousand boys and girls have entered the track meet to be held at Triborough Stadium, Randall's Island on Sunday, July 22nd at 2:00 P.M. This will be the second in a series of four athletic meets sponsored by the New York Athletic Club through its Youth Athletic Council. They are part of a sports activities program intended to encourage physical fitness among the youth of New York City.

Fifteen events for boys and girls are on the program for each meet as follows: boys' events, 100 lb. class- 50 yard dash; 110 lb. class- 60 yard dash; 120 lb. class- 70 yard dash; unlimited class- 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 440 yard run, half-mile, mile, running broad jump, running high jump, and 12 lb. shot pub. Girls' events are 100 lb. class- 40 yard dash; 110 lb. class- 50 yard dash; 120 lb. class- 60 yard dash and potato race.

The above events will be open to all youngsters who desire to compete, irrespective of what organizations they are members of. However boys and girls who have won prizes in P.S.A.L. or private high school meets or who are members of the Amateur Athletic Union are incligible to compete in these events. This rule will be enforced in order to encourage youngsters who have never won prizes to participate in these meets.

In addition to the events for boys and girls 17 years of age and under, four handicap events open to athletes registered with the Metropolitan Association of the A.A.U. will be conducted. These events will be: 100 yard dash, 440 yard run, 2 mile, and 120 yard hurdle.

Prizes consisting of gold filled medals for first place, sterling silver medals for second place, and bronze medals for third place, are being furnished by the New York Athletic Club for each event.

The meets are being organized and conducted by the Recreation Staff of the Department of Parks, and the expense of furnishing prizes and printing entry blanks is being defrayed by the New York Athletic Club. There is no entry fee for entering any of the events. There is no charge for admission to the meets, and the general public is invited to attend. Similar meets will be held on August 5th at VanCortlandt Stadium in the Bronx, and on August 19th at Victory Field in Queens.

Entry blanks may be secured and filed at neighborhood playgrounds and at Park Department headquarters in each of the boroughs.

STATEMENT BY ROBERT MOSES

An unusual amount of publicity has been given to the alleged refusal of the Department of Parks to permit disabled veterans in wheel-chairs to use park boardwalks. There is no general rule against such use.

The boardwalk signs referred to by certain critics and placed there before the war state that no vehicles except baby carriages are permitted. These signs were aimed at bicycles, velocipedes and scooters which are prohibited under Section 45 of the Park Rules and Regulations, except at times and locations designated by the department. They were not simed at individual veterans or invalids in wheelchairs, and, as a matter of fact, such wheelchairs are licensed at Coney Island where a similar sign is posted. These signs will now be changed and will read:

PROHIBITED USE

Any vehicle except baby carriages and wheelchairs for invalids.

The Halloran incident referred to by the press is in a totally different category. I have given a report on this subject to the Mayor, who released it to the newspapers. An additional copy is attached. In this report, it is pointed out that the department had made arrangements to permit this group to use the boardwalk, but that impossible last minute impositions of the volunteer sponsors made it impossible for us to comply. You will see that General Devoe, Commanding Officer at Halloran Hospital, in his statement to the press said that he felt that our actions

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were justified. Please note particularly this sentence in General Devoe's statement:

"The second choice of location offered a swimming pool with safety enclosures, facilities for cooking and serving a picnic supper, making it thus a secluded and well-accommodated outing for a helpless group of wounded soldiers."

We must control large parties and groups, whether composed of civilians or servicemen, by licenses and permits. I want to emphasize that we never raised a question about individual wounded veterans using the boardwalk. We were asked to permit a group of 26 seriously wounded men, with a retinue of nearly 100 attendants, nurses, and doctors, to hold a pionic on the boardwalk and to bring in refreshments and food for a party of this size. This meant additional arrangements and precautions on our part for the benefit and protection of the veterans themselves. The sponsors did not find these acceptable.

I have always, as the City and State Park head, cooperated with official representatives of the Armed Forces in an effort to make the recreational facilities of the City available to all servicemen temporarily on leave, stationed at one of the many posts within the City and Metropolitan Region, or confined to one of the convalescent hospitals.

Some time ago, the Park Department gave Halloren Hospital the exclusive use of a section of Willowbrook Park as a picnic grounds and a place of outdoor recreation. Special provision has been made for the convalescents at Halloren Hospital so that they may enjoy fishing in the lake at Willowbrook Park. Two years ago at Coney Island, a section of the beach at the Half Moon Hotel was set aside solely for naval convalescents and their friends. Servicemen are permitted to use our golf courses, tennis

courts and the ice and roller skating rink at Flushing Meadow Park on weekdays, and the swimming pools and bath houses at Orchard Beach and Jacob Riis on weekdays and on Saturdays and Sundays, all without charge. They are admitted to the Aquacade at Flushing Meadow Park at half price. Last year, we arranged with the War Department for an army show in Contral Park, not to speak of servicemen actually quartered in our parks on emergency defense work. Since 1944, a special dance has been held weekly at Heckscher Playground in Central Park for servicemen and women only. In such activities as the Barber Shop Quartet Contest and the Harvest Dance Contest special divisions with prizes are set up for servicemen and women so that they do not compete against civilian groups who may have been organized for a long period of time.

Since the beginning of the war emergency, all the resources of the City Park Department have been made available to the Armed Forces and to all federal agencies such as the Treasury Department in the war bond drives. Similar arrangements have been made at Jones Beach and in other state parks in the Metropolitan Region.

I will do everything in my power to carry out the request of responsible officers of the Armed Forces. It is, however, our policy to work only with accredited government officials. We cannot deal with volunteers who speak without authority and whose actions are often repudiated by the Officers in Charge. That was the trouble with the recent Halloran incident. From now on, as to this hospital, we shall work with General Devoe and shall be happy to continue close cooperation with him. If General Devoe wants the exclusive use of individual park areas for certain hours, doubtless it can be arranged.

STATEMENT BY COMMISSIONER MOSES

made an entirely false statement to the press to the effect that wounded veterans in wheelchairs are excluded from City parks and specifically from boardwalks and beaches. There is no such ruling and thousands of veterans are being accommodated in both City and State parks including convalescents in wheelchairs. In addition, all sorts of special facilities have been made available and entertainments have been provided in cooperation with the doctors in charge of these and other service men.

The particular incident which led to this discussion occurred at Halloran Hospital, Staten Island. A doctor in charge of a ward in which there are badly wounded men, still in serious condition, conceived the idea of taking these men to beaches together with nurses, doctors and attendants. The first thought of this doctor and the various volunteer agencies, including the Red Cross, was to take these men to Jones Beach. It was pointed out that this was a two and one-half hour trip each tay, that the men would be exhausted and that it would be a tough journey even for people in the best of health.

At this stage, an appeal was made to me, and I directed our executives to try in every possible way to work out something satisfactory, as an experiment, either at Roosevelt Beach or at Wolf's Pond, Staten Island. After a field inspection with representatives of the volunteer groups, we offered a section of the Roosevelt boardwalk with adequate access. Our information was that the party was to consist of twenty-six wounded veterans

and sufficient nurses, doctors and attendants to raise the total to one hundred twenty-five people. Not only was a great deal of time and effort given to making this experiment a success, but I personally began a study of other means of entertaining men in this location especially through boat excursions.

Just before the time came for the experiment, additional conditions were imposed and arbitrary demands by the Halloran volunteer group which would have made it impossible for us successfully to carry out the plan. It turned out that the idea back of the experiment was that these veterans should mingle with public crowds in the face of the fact that they are seriously wounded cases requiring constant attention of a large number of nurses and doctors, especially on park trips of this kind. Under these circumstances, the park officials must find means of protecting them from curiousity seekers, small children, etc.

The success of an experiment of this sort depends not only upon knowledge of nursing but of park operation. Under the conditions, we were forced to notify the hospital people that we could not attempt the experiment in the face of the arbitrary and unworkable orders they insisted upon.

It may be noted in passing that precisely the opposite conclusion as to recreation for seriously wounded men has been reached by practically all of the other doctors in the armed services with whom we have had contacts. For example, we have provided for Navy convalescents at the Half Moon Hotel a section of beach roped off at the insistence of the Navy doctors who said it would be impossible to care for these men adequately

and to preserve order unless they had a beach exclusively for their use.

General Devoe, the head of Halloran General Hospital, has disclaimed any responsibility for the false publicity given the press. He says that he has no criticism of the Park Department and that he is well satisfied with the arrangements finally made under which the hospital takes care of this problem at another location not involving the problems encountered at a public beach. He further certifies that the statements criticising park policy in this case did not originate from official sources and do not have his sympathy.

General Devoe's statement to the Associated Press reads as follows:

"Whatever restrictions Commissioner Moses has outlined in the use of the Franklin D. Roosevelt Boardwalk for the good of the greatest number are considered justifiable by this installation. We are certain that if we had requested a special concession for an outing for patients from Halloran General Hospital on an organized Red Cross recreational trip that complete cooperation would have been extended. At this time, however, a substitute was found that provided many more comforts and facilities to the patients. It was decided, therefore, to change the locale of the outing to where they would have the best time. The second choice of location offered a swimming pool with safety enclosures, facilities for cooking and serving a picnic supper, making it thus a secluded and well accommodated outing for a helpless group of wounded soldiers. "

The City Park Department will continue to do everything humanly possible to provide recreation for veterans, well or wounded, but with the immense crowds in the City, shortage of help, and other problems including travel regulations which prevent people from leaving town on their normal vacations, the

needs and demands of all the various groups and ages which make up the City's population, permanent and transient, must be reconciled. No other city has anything like New York's summer recreation problems. No other city has done as much in recent years to expand its recreation system.

Under these conditions, no purpose is served by malicious statements, baseless criticisms and attempts by irresponsible busybodies to stir up antagonisms and create friction. The critics have no monopoly of interest in wounded and other service men. This is an enthusiasm shared by every red-blooded American.

Age to be determined as of August 1, 1945

Contestants may swim only in the age group in which they belong and may compete at only one swimming pool.

Prizes will be awarded to competitors finishing first and second in each event at all swimming pools. First and second place winners will also qualify to compete in the New York City Championships to be held at McCarren Park Swimming Pool, Driggs Avenue and Lorimer Street, Brooklyn, on Tuesday, August 28, 1945 at 5:00 P.M.

Additional prizes will be awarded to competitors finishing first, second and third in City championships.
